NCF AWARDS THREE SCHOLARSHIPS!


Three scholarships were awarded by the Nye Community. Two of the scholarships of \$700 each were from the Nye Community Foundation, and the other, of \$500 was made possible by individual donations at the Monday Night Football suppers provided by David Butler at Carters Camp and an anonymous donor.

The Foundation solicited applicants for all three scholarships, interviewed seven finalists and selected the winners.

Recipients were: Neil Lehner, a graduating senior this year at Absarokee High School, \$700; Aspen Guthrie, a junior at Montana State University at Bozeman, \$700; and Jon Mudd, a junior at Concordia College, Moorhead, MN \$500.

Lehner, the son of Sheila and Scott Lehner, plans to study biology and work as a wildlife biologist. In high school he was president of his senior class, and was active in sports, being captain of both the football team and varsity

and Band/Pep Band for 2 years. His involvement in community service include FFA and 4H for 7 years, volunteer work at the Cobblestone Community Center and at the Vocational Advisory Council "Quick Draw".

She also volunteers for the Habitat for Humanity. She has done community service work while in FFA and 4H club including garbage pickup and Christmas Angel Tree shopping. Guthrie is enrolled in an exchange program at the University of New Hampshire which helps master's degree candidates determine if that program will meet their needs.



NYE GOES NUTS PROCEEDS GO TO THE COMMUNITY

The Nye Community Foundation cleared about \$13,000 at Nye Goes nuts 2002! From these proceeds, the Foundation gave: \$650 to the Nye Volunteer Fire Dept; \$250 to the Nye School \$200 to the Absarokee Recreations Association; \$200 to the American Youth Soccer Association; and \$700 for a scholarship. The total came to \$1950.00. Some of the remaining proceeds were reserved for start-up expenses for this years' Nye Goes Nuts, and the balance was deposited in the Foundation's investment account, administered by the Montana Community Foundation.


The Foundation also gave a \$700 – scholarship from the interest income on its investment account, administered by Montana Community Foundation.

The Nye Foundation has received many benefits from its affiliation with the Montana Community Foundation. First, through this connection we have been recognized as a viable, non-profit group. The Nye Community Foundation received its 501-(c)³ status in April of 2003, designating it an official non-profit organization. The connection with the Montana Community Foundation also enabled us to apply for and receive grant money from other foundations, such as the Steele-Reese grant of \$1,240 for the Nye School playground equipment. Another grant application has been submitted. Second, by having an investment (or endowment) account, administered by the Montana Community Foundation, our money is pooled with that of other Foundations ina large investment account which gives us bigger returns in interest income than if we were to invest our small amount on our own. Third, and especially important- this investment account assures the Nye community that there will be financial resources in the future for the facilities in Nye.




2002 ATV AND MOUNTAIN BIKE WINNERS

LOCAL NYE SPORTS FAN DONATES TO NYE SCHOLARSHIPS!!

The official name is David Butler, but everyone at Nye knows him as "Pappy", the man who makes Monday Night Football a special event at Carters Camp. For 5 years Pappy has been providing chili and stew for the people who come to Carters Camp to watch

the game. Ken Kunz provides the rolls, bowls and silverware. "I've enjoyed eating the chili while watching the game and I thought others might, so I started this when Fran and Gordon Curran were the owners and I've continued ever since." A couple of



years ago someone told Pappy he should charge for the chili and the stew. Instead, after discussion with Ken Kunz, Pappy let people donate to a scholarship fund. A glass jar was place on the bar and the donations began. Last year, the first year of the fund, the glass jar held \$165 at the end of the season. This year it held \$265. Last year the money was given to the Nye Community Foundation and added to their scholarship fund. This year the fund of \$265 was added to the funds from an anonymous donor and a third scholarships was awarded through the foundation. Pappy, a staunch supporter of scholarships, wished the fund was bigger, but agreed that "every little bit helps."
